



Checklist Physical Security

School shooting tragedies reveal the need for preparedness. But many K-12 schools lack physical security measures to stop an active shooter. This checklist offers suggestions for protecting school buildings.

Adapt this checklist to meet your school's specific needs. Some items might not apply for every school. For each item, check the appropriate "yes" or "no" box. If the answer is "no," consider whether further action is necessary, such as talking to a physical security expert or your school's legal counsel.
